COUNCIL PACKET

RIVERSIDE CITY COUNCIL MEETING: June 1, 2020

The Riverside City Council meeting opened at 6:00 pm in City Hall with Mayor Allen Schneider requesting roll call. Council members present were: Tom Sexton, Andy Rodgers, Edgar McGuire, Lois Schneider, and Jeanine Redlinger.

Motion by Sexton to approve agenda with changes. Second by Rodgers, passed 5-0.

Rodgers moved to approve the minutes of May 7th and 18th, 2020, expenditures, and liquor license for Copper Creek Ridge. Second by McGuire, passed 5-0.

Bill Stukey, PeopleService Inc. presented maintenance contract for generators.

Sexton moved to approve Planned Maintenance Agreement with Cummins Sales and Service in the amount of \$5,791.18. Second by Schneider, passed 5-0.

Council reviewed four bids for a new city maintenance truck.

McGuire moved to accept the low bid on a 2020 Dodge, from Capper Auto, Washington, for \$38,177.00, with accessories and snow plow from Midwest Frame, Iowa City in the amount of \$10,798.28. Second by Sexton, passed 5-0.

Yancey presented bids for foyer wall in City Hall lobby.

Redlinger moved to approve wall expenditures up to \$4000.00. Second by McGuire, passed 5-0.

Sexton moved to open parks, playgrounds, ball fields, dog park, volley ball court, and tennis court. City Hall and restrooms will remain closed. Second by Schneider, passed 5-0.

Scott Pottorff, MMS Consultants reported on the 4th Street, and Safe Walk to School sidewalk projects. A pre-con meeting will be set this month for sidewalk with Iowa DOT and contractors.

Late fees and disconnects on water accounts were suspended for April and May due to Covid-19. McGuire moved to return to regular late fee and disconnect schedule. Second by Sexton, passed 5-0. City will send letters to those scheduled for disconnect.

Rodgers moved to accept bid from Custom Tree Service, Riverside, for removal of three dead trees in City ROW. Second by Schneider, passed 5-0.

Mayor set June 8th as a Council work session for Downtown Business Grants.

Mayor and Rodgers presented options for council to consider in reference to the ambulance service.

Mayor asked for council input on continuing discussions with Washington County Ambulance Service. Redlinger and Schneider; yes. McGuire, Sexton, Rodgers; no.

Three New Housing Opportunities for Cities

Upper Story Rehabilitation

Applications due July 31.

The program supports the rehabilitation of the upper story of a downtown building or buildings under a single owner into rental housing. At least 51% of renters must be low to moderate income and HOME program rental limits apply. Renters' incomes must be verified for a 5-year period. The application process may require a market study at the applicant's expense. The maximum grant amount is \$500,000 for seven units. The grant amount is based on the percentage of low to moderate income units. The project must be completed in three years.

Homebuyer Assistance

Ongoing application process. Applications processed on a first-come, first-served basis until funds are depleted. Early action is important to secure funding.

This grant allows cities to provide down payment assistance for up to five home buyers with a maximum award of \$24,999 per home. The program covers 50% of down payment assistance required by lender, up to \$3,500 in closing costs, and \$300 inspection fee and provides a five-year forgivable loan to the buyer.

Owner-Occupied Rehabilitation

Ongoing application process. IEDA will begin to review applications on July 1. Applications processed on a first-come, first-served basis until funds are depleted. Early action is important to secure funding.

This program may be used for the following eligible activities: architectural barrier removal, energy efficiency improvements or exterior improvements. A maximum of six homes per eligible activity may be identified in the application. An application may propose to conduct two activities on different homes, but removal of architectural barriers must be one of the activities proposed in the application.

Architectural Barrier Removal	Household must have member who is 60 or over or a severely disabled person and the eligible work items are those that would assist the household members to remain living in their home as they age, with some specific work items not eligible.
Energy Efficiency Improvements	Eligible work items are those that make the home more energy efficient, including new windows and doors. Materials used must meet certain criteria as outlined by IEDA, i.e. windows cannot be vinyl.
Exterior Improvements	Eligible work items include roofs, gutters, siding, fascia, soffit, foundations, outside stairways, etc. Some materials used must meet certain criteria as outlined by IEDA.

All properties must be under contract within six months of release of funds, and the work must be completed within two years. A maximum of \$24,999 per home may be allotted (\$38,500 with lead mitigation). Assisted households must be income-qualified and the properties deemed eligible prior to the application being submitted to IEDA, requiring ECICOG to charge \$3,000 per application. No local match is required; cities may determine how much they would like to contribute toward the program.

POLLUTION PREVENTION PLAN

This project is regulated by the requirements of the Iowa Department of Natural Resources (DNR) National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System (NPDES) General Permit No. 2, OR an Iowa Department of Natural Resources (DNR) National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System (NPDES) individual storm water permit. The Contractor shall carry out the terms and conditions of this permit and the Pollution Prevention Plan (PPP).

This Base PPP includes information on Roles and Responsibilities, Project Site Description, Controls, Maintenance Procedures, Inspection Requirements, Non-Storm Water Controls, Potential Sources of Off Right-of-Way Pollution, and Definitions. This plan references other documents rather than repeating the information contained in the documents. A copy of this base Pollution Prevention Plan, amended as needed per plan revisions or by contract modification, will be readily available for review.

All contractors shall conduct their operations in a manner that controls pollutants, minimizes erosion, and prevents sediments from entering waters of the state and leaving the highway right-of-way. The prime contractor shall be responsible for compliance and implementation of the PPP for their entire contract. This responsibility shall be further shared with subcontractors whose work is a source of potential pollution as defined in this PPP.

I. ROLES AND RESPONSIBILITIES

- A. Designer:
 1. Prepares Base PPP included in the project plan.
 2. Provides a copy of the PPP (NOI) to the DNR and to Iowa DNR.
 3. Is Signature authority on the Base PPP.
- B. Contractor:
 1. Signs a co-permittee certification statement adhering to the requirements of the NPDES permit and this PPP. All co-permittees are legally required under the Clean Water Act and the Iowa Administrative Code to ensure compliance with the terms and conditions of the NPDES permit.
 2. Designates a Water Pollution Control Manager (WPCM), who has the duties and responsibilities as defined in Section 2682 of the Standard Specifications.
 3. Submits an Erosion Control Implementation Plan (ECCIP) and ECP updates according to Section 2682 of the Standard Specifications.
 4. Installs and maintains appropriate controls. This work may be subcontracted.
 5. Supervises and implements good housekeeping practices.
 6. Conducts joint required inspections of the site with inspection staff. When Contractor is not mobilized on site, Contractor may delegate this responsibility to a trained or certified subcontractor. Contracting Authority also may waive joint inspection requirement during winter shutdown. In both circumstances, WPCM (or trained or certified delegate from the contractor) is still responsible to review and sign inspection reports.
 7. Coordinates training and certification requirements of Section 2682 of the Standard Specifications.
- C. Subcontractors:
 1. Sign a co-permittee certification statement adhering to the requirements of the NPDES permit and this PPP if responsible for sediment or erosion controls or involved in land disturbing activities. All co-permittees are legally required under the Clean Water Act and the Iowa Administrative Code to ensure compliance with the terms and conditions of this PPP.
- D. RCE/Project Engineer:
 1. Is Project Storm Water Manager.
 2. Takes actions necessary to ensure compliance with storm water requirements including, where appropriate, issuing stop work orders, and directing additional inspections at construction project sites that are experiencing problems with achieving permit requirements.
 3. Orders the taking of measures to cease, correct, prevent, or minimize the consequences of non-compliance with the storm water requirements of the Applicable Permit.
 4. Supervises all work necessary to meet storm water requirements at the Project, including work performed by contractors and subcontractors.
 5. Requires employees, contractors, and subcontractors to take appropriate, responsible action to comply with storm water requirements, including requiring any such person to cease or correct a violation of storm water requirements, and to order or recommend such other actions as necessary to meet storm water requirements.
 6. Is familiar with the Project PPP and storm water site map.
 7. Is the point of contact for the Project for regulatory officials, inspectors, contractors, and subcontractors regarding storm water requirements.
 8. Is the signature authority on Notice of Discontinuation.

II. PROJECT SITE DESCRIPTION

- A. This Pollution Prevention Plan (PPP) is for the construction of FOUR BOX CULVERT EXTENSIONS AND ASSOCIATED DITCH GRADING.
- B. This PPP covers approximately 5.4 acres with an estimated 5.4 acres being disturbed. The portion of the PPP covered by this contract has 5.4 acres disturbed.
- C. The PPP is located in an area of 1 soil association (OLEY-LA006A).
- D. The estimated weighted average runoff coefficient number for this PPP after completion will be 0.2.
- E. Storm Water Site Map - Multiple sources of information comprise the base storm water site map including:
 1. Drainage Patterns - Plan and Profile sheets and Situation Plans.
 2. Proposed Slopes - Cross Sections.
 3. Areas of Soil Disturbance - Construction limits shown on Plan and Profile sheets.
 4. Locations of Non-Structural Controls - Tabulations in C sheets.
 5. Locations of Stabilization Practices - Project Location Map and Plan and Profile sheets.
 6. Surface Waters (including wetlands) - Project Location Map and Plan and Profile sheets.
 7. Surface Waters (including wetlands) - Project Location Map and Plan and Profile sheets.
 8. Locations where Storm Water is Discharged - Plan and Profile sheets.
- F. Also due to project phasing, erosion and sediment controls shown on project plans may not be installed until needed, based on site conditions. For example, silt fence ditch checks will typically not be installed until the ditch has been installed. Installed locations may also be modified from tabulation locations by field staff. Installed locations will be as follows:

F. Runoff from this work will flow into a TRIBUTARY OF THE ENGLISH RIVER.

The Contractor's ECP specified in Article 2602.03 of the Standard Specifications for accomplishment of storm water controls should follow the intended sequence of major activities, and for each activity define the control measure and the timing during the construction process that the measure will be implemented.

Preserve vegetation in areas not needed for construction. Sections 2682 and 2683 of the Standard Specifications define requirements to implement erosion and sediment control measures. Contractors are required to stabilize disturbed areas during construction. Additional erosion and sediment control items may be required as determined by the Inspector and/or contractor during storm water monitoring inspections. If the work involved is not applicable to any contract item, the work will be paid for according to Article 1809.03 paragraph B of the Standard Specifications.

III. CONTROLS

- 1. EROSION CONTROL MEASURES
 - a) Stabilize disturbed areas with approved erosion control practices to be used on this project as referenced in the Standard Road Plans Tabulation (185-4) in the C sheets.
 - b) Preservation of existing vegetation within right-of-way or easements will act as vegetative buffer strips.
 - c) Site plans will ensure that existing vegetation or natural buffers are preserved where attainable and disturbed portions of the site will be stabilized.
 - 1) Initial stabilization of disturbed areas immediately after clearing, grading, excavating, or other earth disturbing activities have been completed on any portion of the site, or
 - 2) Temporarily seeded on any portion of the site and will not resume for a period exceeding 14 calendar days.
 - d) Completed and/or temporary stabilizing seeding and mulching shall be completed as specified in paragraph III, C, 1, 2002, b above.
 - e) Permanent and temporary stabilization practices to be used for this project are located in the Estimated Project Quantities Tabulation (185-4) in the C sheets.
 - f) Additional erosion and sediment control items may be required as determined by the Inspector and/or contractor during storm water monitoring inspections. If the work involved is not applicable to any contract item, the work will be paid for according to Article 1809.03 paragraph B of the Standard Specifications.
- 2. STRUCTURAL PRACTICES
 - a) Structural practices will be implemented to divert flows from exposed soils and detain or otherwise limit runoff and the discharge of pollutants from exposed areas of the site. Additionally, structural practices may include: silt basins that provide 3000 cubic feet of storage per acre defined on equivalent sediment controls, outlet structures that without water provide 3000 cubic feet of storage per acre defined on equivalent sediment controls, and detention basins that provide 3000 cubic feet of storage per acre defined on equivalent sediment controls.
 - b) Structural practices to be used for this project are located in the Estimated Project Quantities (180-9A, 100-1A), or (180-1C) and Estimate Reference Information (180-4A) located in the C sheets, as well as all other item specific Tabulations. Typical drawings detailing construction of the practices to be used on this project can be found in the B sheets-for are referenced in the Standard Road Plans Tabulation (185-4) located in the C sheets.
 - c) Measures shall be installed during the construction process to control pollutants in storm water discharges that will occur after construction operations have been completed. This may include velocity dissipation devices at discharge locations and along length of outfall channels as necessary to provide a non-erosion velocity flow from structure to water course. If included with this project, these items are located in the Estimated Project Quantities (180-9A, 200-1A, or 200-2A) in the C sheets.
 - d) Additional erosion and sediment control items may be required as determined by the Inspector and/or contractor during storm water monitoring inspections. If the work involved is not applicable to any contract item, the work will be paid for according to Article 1809.03 paragraph B of the Standard Specifications.

IV. MAINTENANCE PROCEDURES

The Contractor is required to maintain all temporary erosion and sediment control measures in proper working order, including cleaning, repairing, or replacing them throughout the contract period. This shall begin when the features have lost 80% of their capacity.

OTHER CONTROLS

- 1. Waste Disposal - Do not discharge any materials, including building materials, into waters of the state, except as authorized by a Section 404 permit.
- 2. Spill Prevention and Control - Prevent chemical spills and leaks. In the event of a spill, follow the appropriate spill response procedures to contain and clean up the spill. Do not discharge any materials, including building materials, into waters of the state, except as authorized by a Section 404 permit.
- 3. Concrete Residuals and Washout Wastes - Waste shall not be discharged to a surface water and is not allowed to adversely affect a water of the state. Designate temporary concrete washout facilities for rinsing out concrete trucks. Provide directions to truck drivers where designated washout facilities are located. Designated washout areas should be located at least 90 feet away from storm drains, streams or other water bodies. Care should be taken to ensure these areas are not used for anything other than the intended purpose.
- 4. Concrete Grouting/Grinding Slurry - Do not discharge slurry to a waterbody or storm drain. Slurry may be applied on foreslopes or removed from the project.
- 5. Vehicle and Equipment Storage and Maintenance Areas - Perform on site fueling and maintenance in accordance with all environmental laws such as proper storage of on-site fuels and proper disposal of used engine oil or other fluids on site. Apply spill prevention and control measures to prevent spills and leaks. Do not discharge any materials, including building materials, into waters of the state, except as authorized by a Section 404 permit.
- 6. Litter Management - Ensure employees properly dispose of litter. Minimize exposure of trash if exposure to precipitation or storm water would result in a discharge of pollutants.
- 7. Decontaminating - Properly treat water to remove suspended sediment before it re-enters a waterbody or discharges off-site. Measures are also to be taken to prevent scour erosion at decontaminating discharge point.
- 8. During the course of this construction, it is possible that situations will arise where unknown materials will be encountered. When such situations are encountered, they will be handled according to all federal, state, and local regulations in effect at the time.

V. INSPECTION REQUIREMENTS
 A. Inspections shall be made jointly by the Contractor and the Contracting Authority at least once every seven calendar days. Storm water monitoring inspections will include:
 1. Name of the inspector.
 2. Summary of the scope of the inspection.
 3. Name and qualifications of the personnel making the inspection.
 4. Review of erosion and sediment control measures within disturbed areas for the effectiveness in preventing impacts to receiving waters.
 5. Observations related to the implementation of the PPP.
 6. Recommendations for corrective actions required to maintain or modify erosion and sediment control measures.
 7. Include storm water monitoring inspection reports in the Amended PPP. Incorporate any additional erosion and sediment control measures determined as a result of the inspection. Immediately begin corrective actions on all deficiencies found within 3 calendar days of the inspection and complete within 7 calendar days following the inspection. If it is determined that making the corrections less than 72 hours after the inspection is impracticable, it should be documented why it is impracticable and indicate an estimated date by which the corrections will be made.

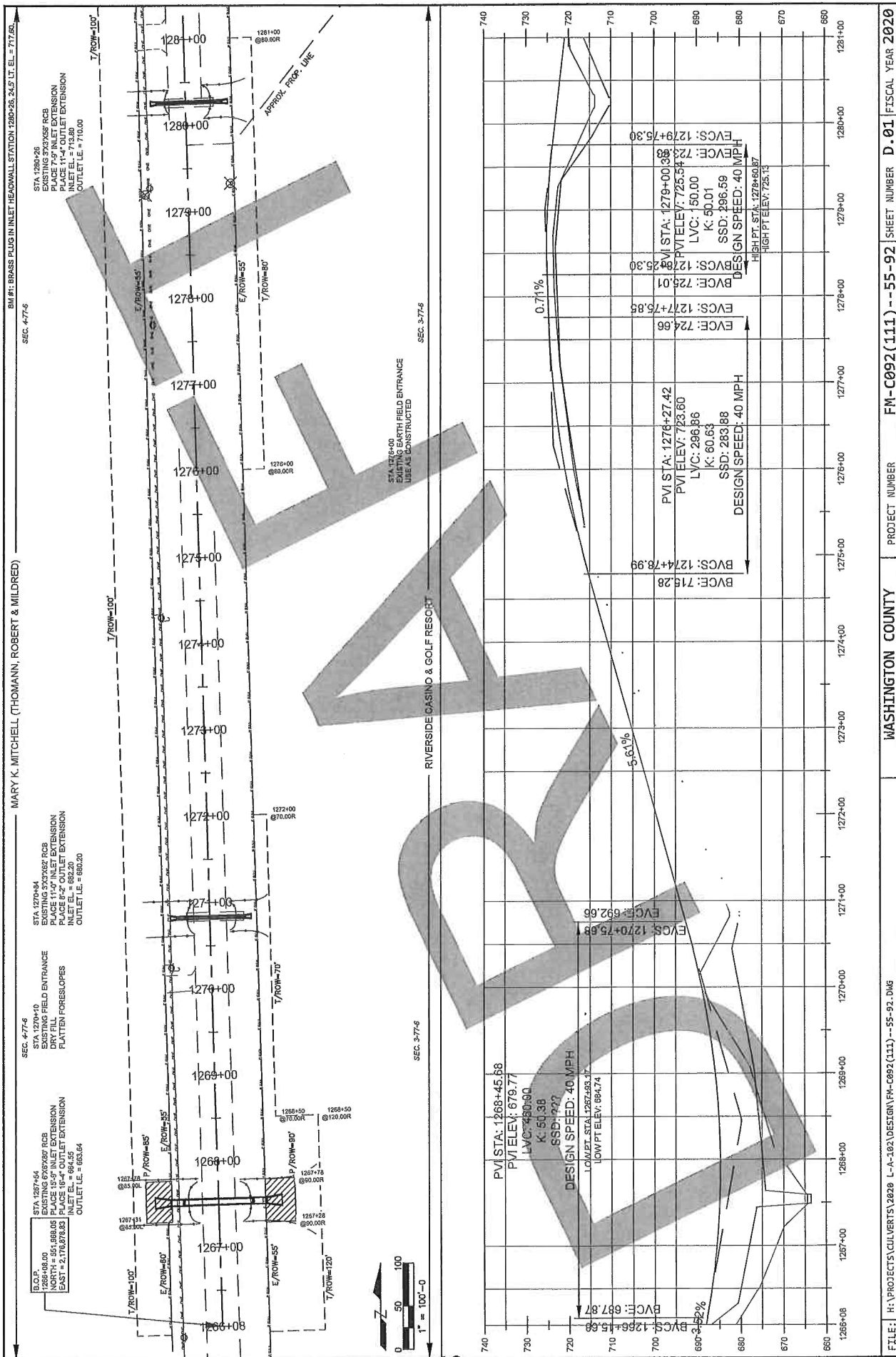
VI. NON-STORM WATER DISCHARGES
 This includes subsurface drains (i.e., longitudinal and standard subdrains) and slope drains. The velocity of the discharge from these features may be controlled by the use of headwalls or blocks, Class A stone, erosion stone or other appropriate materials. PPP also includes uncontaminated groundwater from dewatering operations, which will be controlled as discussed in Section III of the PPP.

VII. POTENTIAL SOURCES OF OFF RIGHT-OF-WAY (ROW) POLLUTION
 Silt, sediment, and other forms of pollution may be transported onto Highway right-of-way (ROW) as a result of a storm event. Pollution within Highway ROW are beyond the control of this PPP. Pollution within Highway ROW will be conveyed and controlled per this PPP.

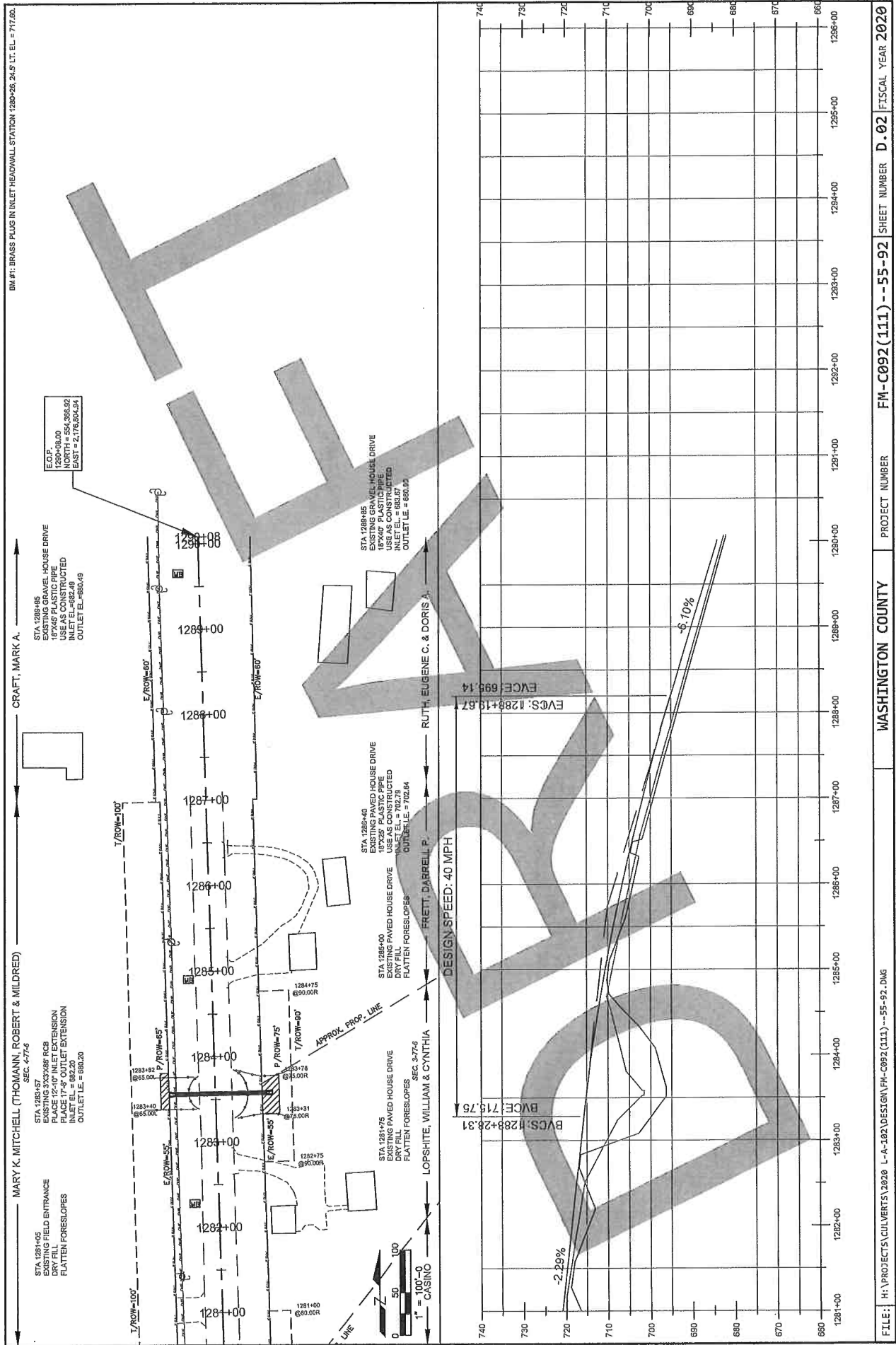

 B. Fieldbook entries - Additions or Contract Modifications for new items, storm water monitoring inspection reports, and fieldbook entries made by the inspector.
 C. IDR - Inspector's Daily Report - this contains the Inspector's daily diary and bid item postings.
 D. Controls - Methods, practices, or measures to minimize or prevent erosion, control sedimentation, control storm water, or minimize contaminants from other types of waste or materials. Also called Best Management Practices (BMPs).
 E. Signature Authority - Representative authorized to sign various storm water documents.

Helen [conclusion (last)]: The total cost of everything is just below \$1,350.

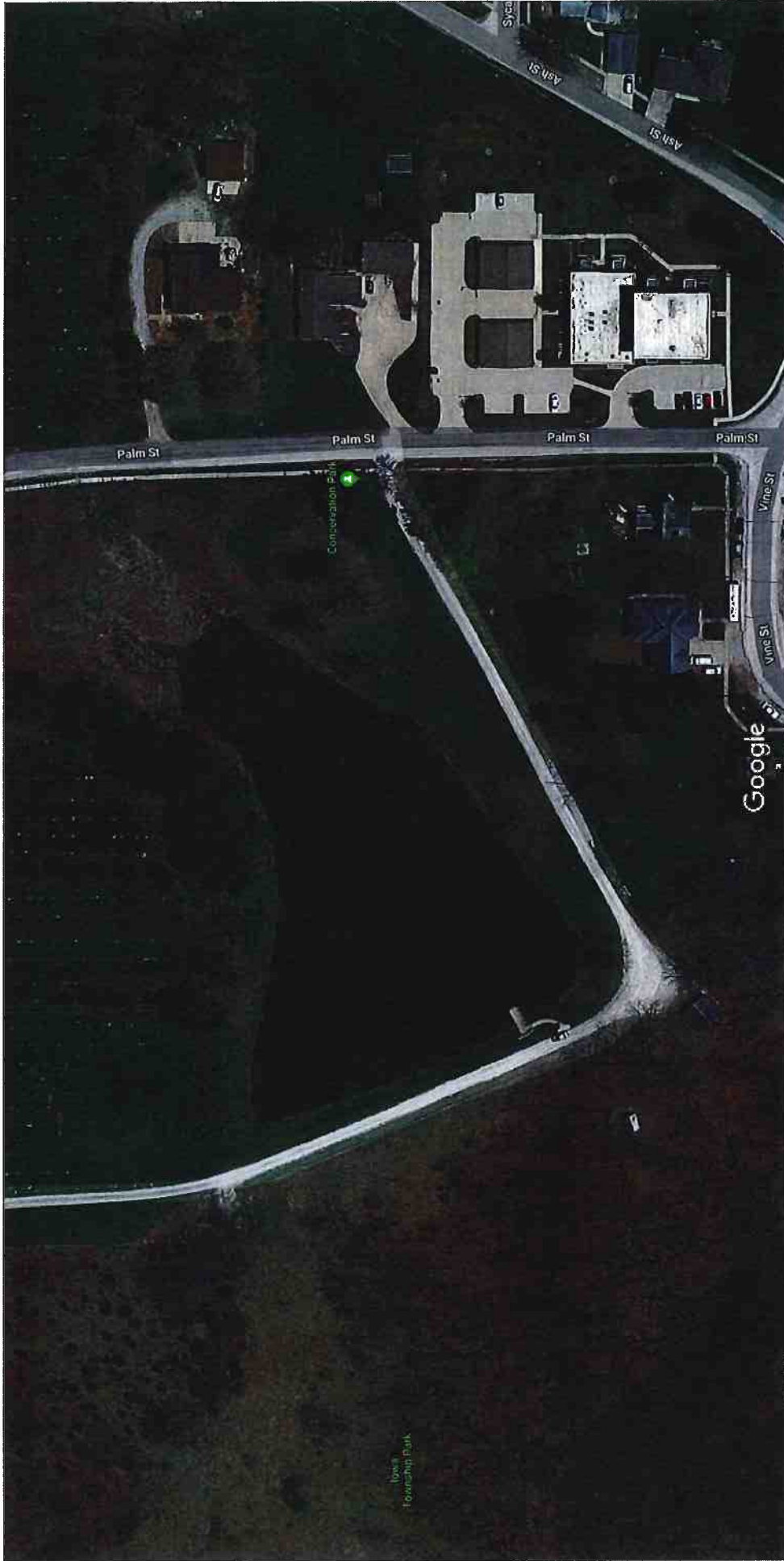

Recommendations for COVID-19 infections associated with baseball & softball teams

The COVID-19 Pandemic is ongoing and the COVID-19 virus is circulating in all Iowa communities. All players, parents, coaches, school administrators, sports associations and tournament directors/organizers have a responsibility to take measures to prevent the spread of COVID-19. The Iowa Department of Public Health (IDPH) strongly recommends that all sports teams adhere to the following guidance.

HEALTH MONITORING: Players and coaches who are part of a high-risk population should not participate in group activities. Fever and symptom monitoring should occur prior to starting any practice or game. All players and coaches should also be asked whether they have been in close contact with a sick person or confirmed COVID-19 case.

ILL PLAYERS OR COACHES: All players and coaches who have had an exposure or who have a fever, cough, or difficulty breathing should be immediately sent home and instructed to contact their healthcare provider. COVID-19 testing is highly encouraged in symptomatic players and coaches to better inform the potential exposure of teammates and coaching staff. Testing is also recommended for persons who have been in close contact with a confirmed case.

Players and coaching staff either testing positive for COVID-19 infection or who are symptomatic but not tested for COVID-19 infection should be excluded until the following criteria are met:

- 10 days after their illness starts AND
- 3 days since their fever resolved (without fever reducing medications) AND
- all other symptoms have improved.

Players and coaching staff testing negative for COVID-19 infection and who are NOT a close contact of a confirmed case can return to normal activities 24 hours after their fever and other symptoms have resolved.

Players and coaching staff testing negative for COVID-19 infection and who ARE close contacts of a confirmed case should continue to self-quarantine until 14 days after their last exposure to the confirmed cases.

WHEN CAN PEOPLE PASS COVID-19 TO OTHERS: COVID-19 infected people can pass it to others from 48 hours before they get sick (symptomatic) until 10 days after they get sick.

If people test positive for COVID-19 infection and never get sick (asymptomatic), assume that they could pass it to others from 10 days before they were tested until 10 days after they were tested.

TEAM EXPOSURES: Coaches are expected to fully cooperate with public health investigations of persons testing positive for COVID-19. All teammates and coaches who have been within 6 feet of the person testing positive for COVID-19 for more than 15 minutes, should self-isolate for 14 days after their last exposure. Exposed players and coaches should not be at practices or games during the 14 day period of self-isolation.

EXPOSURES TO OPPOSING TEAMS: If a player or coach tests positive for COVID-19, all opposing teams (for games played during the time when the infected person could have passed COVID-19 to others) should be notified. Players and coaches on the opposing team should continue to self monitor for COVID-19 symptoms. Close contact (within 6 feet for 15 minutes) between opposing teams is infrequent in baseball and softball, therefore unless there are extenuating circumstances, the opposing team and coaching staff can continue with daily activities without restriction as long as they remain symptom free.

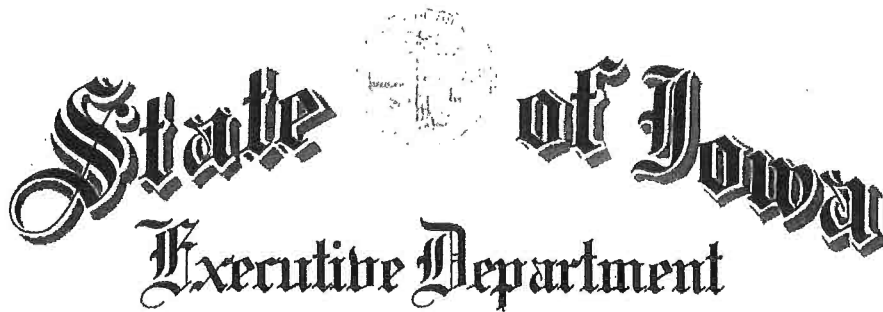

PROCLAMATION OF DISASTER EMERGENCY

WHEREAS, the World Health Organization has reported an outbreak of thousands of cases of Novel Coronavirus 2019 (COVID-19) in multiple countries, causing illness and deaths; and

WHEREAS, on January 31, 2020, the United States Department of Health and Human Services declared a national public health emergency; and

WHEREAS, on March 9, 2020, a Proclamation of Disaster Emergency was issued to coordinate the State of Iowa's response to this outbreak and such disaster continues to exist; and

WHEREAS, on March 11, 2020 the World Health Organization declared the COVID-19 outbreak a global pandemic; and

WHEREAS, on March 13, 2020, President Donald J. Trump issued a proclamation declaring that the COVID-19 outbreak in the United States constitutes a national emergency; and

WHEREAS, on March 17, 2020, a Proclamation of Public Health Disaster Emergency was issued to provide additional needed resources and measures to respond to this disaster, and such public health disaster continues to exist; and

WHEREAS, the risk of transmission of COVID-19 may be substantially reduced by continuing to ensure business takes appropriate public health precautions while reopening.

NOW THEREFORE, I, KIMBERLY K. REYNOLDS, Governor of the State of Iowa, by the power and authority vested in me by the Iowa Constitution, Art. IV, §§ 1, 8 and Iowa Code §§ 29C.6(1), 135.140(6), and 135.144 do hereby proclaim a **STATE OF PUBLIC HEALTH DISASTER EMERGENCY** continues to exist throughout the entire state of Iowa and do hereby **ORDER** and **DIRECT** the following:

PROTECTION OF VULNERABLE IOWANS

SECTION ONE. I continue to strongly encourage all vulnerable Iowans, including those with preexisting medical conditions and those older than 65, in all counties of the state to continue to limit their activities outside of their home, including their visits to businesses and other establishments and their participation in gatherings of any size and any purpose. And I encourage all Iowans to limit their in-person interactions with vulnerable Iowans and to exercise particular care and caution when engaging in any necessary interactions.

REOPENING OF BUSINESSES AND ESTABLISHMENTS

SECTION TWO. Pursuant to Iowa Code § 135.144 (3), and in conjunction with the Iowa Department of Public Health, unless otherwise modified by subsequent proclamation or order of the Iowa Department of Public Health, I hereby order that effective at 8:00 a.m. on June 12, 2020 and until 11:59 p.m. on June 25, 2020:

COUNCIL PACKET

A. **Restaurants and bars:** A restaurant or bar, including a wedding reception venue, winery, brewery, distillery, country club, or other social or fraternal club, may reopen or remain open to serve food and beverages on its premises, but only to the extent that it complies with the following requirements:

- (1) **Social distancing:** The establishment must ensure at least six feet of physical distance between each group or individual dining or drinking alone. Seating at booths closer than six feet may satisfy this requirement if the booths are separated by a barrier of a sufficient height to fully separate seated customers. All patrons must have a seat at a table or bar, and an establishment must limit patrons from congregating together closer than six feet.
- (2) **Other social distancing, hygiene, and public health measures:** The restaurant shall also implement reasonable measures under the circumstances of each restaurant to ensure social distancing of employees and customers, increased hygiene practices, and other public health measures to reduce the risk of transmission of COVID-19 consistent with guidance issued by the Iowa Department of Inspections and Appeals and the Iowa Department of Public Health.

B. **Fitness centers:** A fitness center, health club, health spa, or gym may reopen or remain open, but only to the extent that it complies with the following requirements:

- (1) **Social distancing:** The establishment must ensure that all equipment, such as treadmills, bikes, weight machines, benches, and power racks, are spaced at least six feet apart or take other appropriate measures to ensure that more closely spaced equipment is not used.
- (2) **Group activities:** Any group activities or classes must be limited to a number of people that permits maintaining a distance of six feet apart at all times.
- (3) **Other social distancing, hygiene, and public health measures:** The establishment shall also implement reasonable measures under the circumstances of each establishment to ensure social distancing of employees and customers, increased hygiene practices, and other public health measures to reduce the risk of transmission of COVID-19 consistent with guidance issued by the Iowa Department of Public Health.

C. **Casinos and gaming facilities:** A casino or other facility conducting pari-mutuel wagering or gaming operations may reopen or remain open, but only to the extent that it complies with the following requirements:

- (1) **Social distancing:** The establishment must encourage social distancing by spacing gaming positions at least six feet apart, turning off alternating gaming machines, or separating positions with a barrier of sufficient height to fully separate patrons. The establishment may operate table games provided that it takes reasonable measures to reduce the risk of transmission, such as limiting the number patrons at a table, encouraging or requiring face covering of patrons or employees, providing hand sanitizer, or taking other precautions.
- (2) **Food and Beverage Service:** The establishment shall comply with all the requirements of bars and restaurants in this Proclamation for any food and beverage service.
- (3) **Other social distancing, hygiene, and public health measures:** The establishment shall also implement reasonable measures under the circumstances of each establishment to ensure social distancing of employees and customers, increased hygiene practices, and other public health measures to reduce the risk of transmission of COVID-19 consistent with guidance issued by the Iowa Department of Public Health and, for any food or beverage service, the Iowa Department of Inspections and Appeals.

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- D. Senior citizen centers and adult daycare facilities:** A facility that conducts adult day services or other senior citizen centers may reopen, but only to the extent that the establishment complies with guidance issued by the Iowa Department of Public Health to ensure social distancing, increased hygiene practices, and other public health measures.
- E. Salons and Barbershops:** A salon or barbershop, including any establishment providing the services of barbering, cosmetology, electrology, esthetics, nail technology, manicuring, and pedicuring may reopen, but only to the extent that it complies with the following requirements:
- (1) **Social distancing:** The salon must ensure that all customers are at least six feet apart when performing cosmetology practices or barbering services.
 - (2) **Other social distancing, hygiene, and public health measures:** The salon or barbershop shall also implement reasonable measures under the circumstances of each salon to ensure social distancing of employees and customers, increased hygiene practices, and other public health measures to reduce the risk of transmission of COVID-19 consistent with guidance issued by the Iowa Department of Public Health.
- F. Medical spas:** A medical spa, as defined in Iowa Admin Code § 653-13.8(1), may reopen or remain open to provide medical aesthetic services, but only if the medical spa complies with the requirements for performing outpatient procedures that utilize PPE in section 9, paragraph A, of this Proclamation.
- G. Theaters and Performance Venues:** Any theater or performance venue at which motion pictures are shown or live performances are held may reopen or remain open, but only to the extent that the theater complies with the following requirements:
- (1) **Social distancing:** The theater or performance venue must ensure at least six feet of physical distance between each group or individual attending alone when seated in the theater.
 - (2) **Other social distancing, hygiene, and public health measures:** The theater shall also implement reasonable measures under the circumstances of each theater to ensure social distancing of employees and customers, increased hygiene practices, and other public health measures to reduce the risk of transmission of COVID-19 consistent with guidance issued by the Iowa Department of Public Health and, for any food service, the Iowa Department of Inspections and Appeals.
- H. Race tracks:** A speedway or race track, including a track conducting horse or dog races, may reopen or continue its operations, provided that the establishment complies with the following requirements:
- (1) **Social distancing:** The establishment must ensure at least six feet of physical distance between each group or individual attending alone when seated.
 - (2) **Other social distancing, hygiene, and public health measures:** The establishment shall also implement reasonable measures under the circumstances of each establishment to ensure social distancing of employees and customers, increased hygiene practices, and other public health measures to reduce the risk of transmission of COVID-19 consistent with guidance issued by the Iowa Department of Public Health and, for any food or beverage service, the Iowa Department of Inspections and Appeals.
- I. Malls:** An enclosed mall may reopen or remain open, but only to the extent that it complies with the following requirements:
- (1) **Play areas:** Any play area or playground in a common area must remain closed.

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(2) **Social distancing, hygiene, and public health measures:** The mall shall also implement reasonable measures under the circumstances of each mall to ensure social distancing of employees and customers, increased hygiene practices, and other public health measures to reduce the risk of transmission of COVID-19 consistent with guidance issued by the Iowa Department of Public Health.

J. **Other establishments:** A museum, aquarium, zoo, library, indoor playground, children's play center, swimming pool, bingo hall, bowling alley, pool hall, arcade, amusement park, campground, tanning facility, massage therapy establishment, tattoo establishment, or a retail establishment that was previously ordered to be closed statewide and then only in certain counties under section 5, paragraph I, of the Proclamation of Disaster Emergency issued on April 27, 2020, may reopen or remain open, but only to the extent that the facility takes reasonable measures under the circumstances of each establishment to ensure social distancing of employees and patrons, increased hygiene practices, and other public health measures to reduce the risk of transmission of COVID-19 consistent with Guidance issued by the Iowa Department of Public Health.

MASS GATHERINGS

SECTION THREE. Pursuant to Iowa Code § 135.144 (3), and in conjunction with the Iowa Department of Public Health, unless otherwise modified by subsequent proclamation or order of the Iowa Department of Public Health, continuing until 11:59 p.m. on June 25, 2020:

- A. A social, community, recreational, leisure, or sporting gathering or event, including but not limited to a parade, festival, farmers market, auction, convention, or fundraiser, of more than ten people may be held, but only if the gathering complies with all other relevant provisions in this Proclamation and the following requirements:
- (1) **Social distancing:** The gathering organizer must ensure at least six feet of physical distance between each group or individual attending alone.
 - (2) **Other social distancing, hygiene, and public health measures:** The gathering organizer shall also implement reasonable measures under the circumstances of each gathering to ensure social distancing of gathering participants, increased hygiene practices, and other public health measures to reduce the risk of transmission of COVID-19 consistent with guidance issued by the Iowa Department of Public Health and, for any food service, the Iowa Department of Inspections and Appeals.
- B. **Non-school sporting and recreational events:** Practices, games, and competitions for baseball, softball, and individual sports, such as running, biking, swimming, tennis, and golf, are not prohibited by this section even where athletes may have some contact within six feet, provided that the organizer of such activities and events implements reasonable measures under the circumstances of each gathering to ensure reasonable social distancing, increased hygiene practices, and other public health measures to reduce the risk of transmission of COVID-19 consistent with guidance issued by the Iowa Department of Public Health.
- C. **Spiritual and religious gatherings:** Spiritual and religious gatherings, including any funerals or weddings, are not prohibited by this section. But a church, synagogue, or other host of a spiritual or religious gathering shall implement reasonable measures under the circumstances of each gathering to ensure social distancing of employees, volunteers, and other participants, increased hygiene practices, and other public health measures to reduce the risk of transmission of COVID-19 consistent with guidance issued by the Iowa Department of Public Health.

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NONESSENTIAL OR ELECTIVE SURGERIES AND PROCEDURES

SECTION FOUR. Pursuant to Iowa Code § 135.144(3), and in conjunction with the Iowa Department of Public Health, unless otherwise modified by subsequent proclamation or order of the Iowa Department of Public Health, I continue to order that until this disaster proclamation expires:

- A. A hospital, outpatient surgery provider, or outpatient procedure provider may conduct in-patient surgeries and procedures that, if further delayed, will pose a significant risk to quality of life and any outpatient surgeries or procedures if the hospital or provider complies with the following requirements:
 - (1) A hospital or provider must have:
 - (a) Adequate inventories of personal protective equipment (PPE) and access to a reliable supply chain without relying on state or local government PPE stockpiles to support continued operations and respond to an unexpected surge in a timely manner; and
 - (b) A plan to conserve PPE consistent with guidance from the CDC and Iowa Department of Public Health;
 - (2) A hospital or provider must have a plan for timely COVID-19 testing of symptomatic patients and staff to rapidly mitigate potential clusters of infection and as otherwise clinically indicated. Providers must comply with any relevant guidance related to testing requirements for patients and staff issued by the Iowa Department of Public Health, the CDC, or a provider's professional specialty society. For scheduled surgeries patients should have a negative COVID-19 test performed within 72 hours of surgery date. If a COVID-19 test is not available, a hospital or provider should consider alternative methods to determine the patient's probability of COVID-19. If the patient has symptoms of fever, cough, or low oxygen saturation, then postponing the surgery is recommended.
 - (3) A hospital must continue to accept and treat COVID-19 patients and must not transfer COVID-19 patients to create capacity for elective procedures.
 - (4) A hospital must reserve at least 10% of intensive care unit (ICU) beds and 10% of medical/surgical beds for COVID-19 patients.
 - (5) A hospital or provider that begins conducting surgeries or procedures as authorized by this paragraph but is no longer able to satisfy all these requirements must cease conducting such surgeries or procedures except as authorized by paragraph B. All hospitals and providers shall have a plan in place to monitor compliance and a transition plan to reduce or suspend procedures and surgeries as necessary.
- B. Except as provided in paragraph A, all nonessential or elective surgeries and procedures that utilize PPE must not be conducted by any hospital, outpatient surgery provider, or outpatient procedure provider, whether public, private, or nonprofit.
- C. A nonessential surgery or procedure is one that can be delayed without undue risk to the current or future health of a patient, considering all appropriate factors including, but not limited to any: (1) threat to the patient's life if the surgery or procedure is not performed; (2) threat of permanent dysfunction of an extremity or organ system; (3) risk of metastasis or progression of staging; and (4) risk of rapidly worsening to severe symptoms.
- D. Each hospital, outpatient surgery provider, and outpatient procedure provider shall limit all nonessential individuals in surgery and procedure suites and patient care areas where PPE is required. Only individuals essential to conducting the surgery or procedure shall be present in such areas.

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E. Each hospital, outpatient surgery provider, and outpatient procedure provider shall establish an internal governance structure to ensure that the principles outlined above are followed.

IMPLEMENTATION AND INTERPRETATION

SECTION FIVE. The Iowa Department of Public Safety, Iowa Department of Public Health, Iowa Department of Education, Iowa Department of Homeland Security and Emergency Management, Iowa Department of Transportation, and other participating state agencies are hereby directed to monitor the operation and implementation of this proclamation to assure the public's health and safety.

SECTION SIX. In conjunction with the Department of Public Health pursuant to Iowa Code §§ 29C.18 and 135.35, all peace officers of the state are hereby called upon to assist in the enforcement of the provisions of this Proclamation.

SECTION SEVEN. The provisions of this proclamation shall be effective at 8:00 a.m. on June 12, 2020, unless otherwise noted. This proclamation shall not be construed to otherwise modify the proclamation of May 26, 2020. This state of public health disaster emergency shall continue to expire on June 25, 2020, at 11:59 p.m., unless sooner terminated or extended in writing by me.
